



- 1** St Dorstan's Church – Ruined 16th Century Church with interesting tombs in the graveyard. Note the tiny Doocone in the garden of the former manse (1822).
- 2** Aberdour Beach – The Jane Whyte Memorial recalls the saving of the 15 crewmen from the 'William Hope' which ran aground in a storm in 1884. She single handedly managed to get a line from the shore to the ship by which the men escaped.
- 3** Aberdour Caves – Alexander Forbes 4th Lord Pitsligo lost his estates after the failure of the 1745 Jacobite rebellion at Culloden. Although outlawed he remained at a large hiding in his tenants houses and sea caves until his death in 1792 at the age of 82.
- 4** Mounthooly Doocone – built in 1800 this was used as a landmark by fishermen. It remains fully equipped with nesting boxes and a potence (revolving ladder giving access to the nests).
- 5** In 1556 the Edward Bonaventure carrying the Russian Ambassador to England was wrecked in Pitsligo Bay. Few of the 100 persons on board survived. The cargo of furs, wax, yarn and other goods washed ashore were *"by the rude and ravenous people of the country thereunto adjoining rifled, spoyled and carried away"*.
