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1. Overview

This document has been generated from information entered into the Integrated Impact Assessment system.

There is funding in place with Speech and Language Therapy (SALT) and the Health Visitor service, to allow for enhanced and targetted support for Early Years across Aberdeenshire.

The SALT provision supports funding for three additional SALT staff (1 FTE band 6, 1 FTE band 7 and 1 FTE band 8A). The Early Years funding contributes to part funding of 4 posts (Family Support Worker Band 5 0.8 FTE, Health Visitor band 7 2 FTE and Community Nursery Nurse band 4 1.96 FTE). These posts support parents from pregancy to 5 - when child starts attending school. The staff will work with Social Work, Early Years staff and other agencies in relation to early intervetion work.

The proposal is that the Early Years Service will cease additional funding for SALT and Health Visitors, which will mean that a statutory service is in place, rather then the current enhanced service. There has been ongoing discussion with the relevant NHS services to prepare for withdrawl of funding.

During screening 6 of 10 questions indicated that detailed assessments were required, the screening questions and their answers are listed in the next section. This led to 3 out of 5 detailed impact assessments being completed. The assessments required are:

- Childrens' Rights and Wellbeing
- Equalities and Fairer Scotland Duty
- Health Inequalities

In total there is 1 positive impact as part of this activity. There are 10 negative impacts, all impacts have been mitigated.

A detailed action plan with 3 points has been provided.

5.9. Overall Outcome

Only Some Negative Impacts Can Be Mitigated.

A significant level of investment is taking place to train staff in universal approaches in supporting children with speech and language needs, as well as developing capacity in parents/ carers. However, regardless of the level of early intervention and capacity building that is taking place, the waiting list will increase. The waiting list in Aberdeenshire is believed to be the lowest in Scotland and this wont be sustainable. The waiting list has increased across Scotland by 7.6 months on average, whereas Aberdeenshire has actually reduced.

The level of impact will be mitigated through a range of approaches and will continue to be mitigated through collaborative working between Council services, NHS Grampian and other relevant external agencies. The work of Health Visitors etc will be improved through working with Community Nurse and Nursery Nurser remits. This will improve equity across Aberdeenshire. The waiting list in Aberdeenshire is exceptionally good. The level of funding from ELC will be reduced over time, in order to allow the service to adapt and for continued improvements across the sector to be put in place.

5.10. Improving Relations

There has been good relations and collaboration between Health and the Council in relation to these areas. The work continues to develop and evolve. There have been a number of improvements and areas developed to support families, which have been made possible through good relations with NHS.

5.11. Opportunities of Equality The changes to Health Visitors etc, will imrove equity of access. There will be an increased universal offering through capaicty building for SALT provision also.
