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1. Overview

This document has been generated from information entered into the Integrated Impact Assessment system.

It is proposed to revise the provision and supply of community bedding plants following consultation with the relevant communities. This consultation is seen as key in order to gauge the need, volume and type of bedding plant requirements. In addition, the impact on town centres and wider communities plus any mitigations provided through working alongside local groups can be assessed. This in turn will inform the appropriate business model for this service including a charging policy for the plants. A part year saving of £20,000 by introducing some charging and reducing costs is planned for 2024/25 with a full year saving of £91,000 from 2025/26.

During screening 1 of 10 questions indicated that detailed assessments were required, the screening questions and their answers are listed in the next section. This led to 1 out of 5 detailed impact assessments being completed. The assessments required are:
